West Rail Line Opens With Parties

After years of planning and construction, the West Light Rail Line through Eiber opened on Friday, April 26th. The Grand Opening Ceremony in Golden was followed by free rides. The celebration continued Saturday with free rides and Station Parties all along the W Line. Three of the stations border or are within the Eiber Neighborhood.

At Wadsworth, neighbors celebrated Lakewood's past, present and future. Lakewood's history was showcased alongside live music, locally-owned and operated businesses and restaurants, sustainability information and a video booth to share memories of Colfax and Lakewood.

At the Garrison Station, the theme was Eiber - Great Neighbors! Visitors enjoyed a cappella and local school group performances, Native American storytelling, food, free cookies, and a historic Lakewood Police car on display. The Neighborhood Association shared information about what the Eiber neighborhood is doing to build a sustainable community.

The Oak Street Station hosted demonstrations and interactive fun with Lakewood's parks, recreation and art/crafts. Lakewood Community Resources highlighted fun things to do and see in Lakewood.

The trains were crowded with riders, the weather was beautiful, and the neighborhood was showcased by the station party activities.

Eiber Elementary Literacy Program Grows

Many children attending our neighborhood Eiber Elementary school are growing up in poverty, without the financial resources and stability necessary to achieve success in school and life. Eiber neighbors are working together to change this and provide these children and their families hope for a better future.

In partnership with U.S. Department of Agriculture employees, St. Paul's Episcopal Church, and Eiber Elementary School, neighborhood residents are working with children at Eiber to offer a vision for a better future by mentoring students and providing literacy, math, and homework assistance. This is the third year of this partnership, and this year the program has really expanded. The school hired a part-time volunteer coordinator.

The program was invited to partner with the Edgewater Collective, a nonprofit organization providing hope through grassroots community development to students in low-income community schools, through the sharing of a volunteer literacy training funded by the Jefferson Foundation. It is never too late to join these efforts and build a better future for our neighborhood.

Eiber Leads the City Toward Sustainability

In the past year the Lakewood Sustainable Neighborhoods Program was launched and Eiber was one of just two neighborhoods to blaze the trail on this new program. In so doing, Eiber became the first 'Outstanding Sustainable Neighborhood' to be recognized by the City of Lakewood.

Eiber was recognized during the Aug. 12 Lakewood City Council meeting and will soon be prominently displaying 'Sustainable Neighborhoods' signage. According to the program guidelines, a sustainable neighborhood is one which enhances the livability of its citizens, promotes sustainability, and reduces the neighborhood's ecological footprint. U.S. Rep

Ed Perlmutter and State Rep. Max Tyler have each noted the neighborhood's accomplishment.

The City of Lakewood was honored for its Sustainable Neighborhoods program at the annual conference of the Colorado Chapter of the American Planning Association in Vail in October. Community representatives of both Eiber (Carrie Sonneborn) and Belmar (Doug Wells) were invited to present at this conference along with city sustainability staff. The program has attracted a lot of attention from other municipalities, such as the City and County of Denver, which is interested in adopting the model.

A myriad of people and projects contributed to this success including the community garden project, Resilience Circle, the Eiber Elementary literacy project, BikeEiber, WildScapes, Eiber history, and a sustainability discussion group. Now the challenge is to maintain and improve our status as a sustainable neighborhood as Eiber continues to grow and evolve. Existing projects need input and volunteers and new projects need to be launched.

Individuals who have done the most to achieve the certification were recognized by the city, including:

Paul Ditson - Neighborhood Heritage, an analysis of development and subdivision patterns over the past 100 years

Tom Slabe - Native seed collection and distribution

Carrie Sonneborn - Resilience Circle

Bill Spriggs - Bike Eiber, a bicycle and pedestrian advocacy initiative

Lois Witte - a literacy program and community garden at Eiber Elementary

This is an annual certification, and the neighborhood will be working hard on sustainability initiatives in the coming year to maintain our sustainable neighborhood status.

We are excited to announce the construction of the Eiber Community Garden, located on the grounds of the Eiber Elementary School at 1385 Independence Street. The paths and garden beds are in place, and the garden will be ready for planting next spring. The Garden Steering Committee has been active this year, putting in place the organizational framework necessary to manage the garden.

This garden is one of many Denver Urban Gardens (DUG) community gardens consciously designed to grow community by using gardens as an extraordinary place for learning and healthy living. This garden will provide local Eiber Elementary students with hands on gardening experience and garden education programs, provide free vegetable seeds and seedlings for low-income families and fixed income seniors, and provide individual garden plots to Eiber neighborhood residents.
